




B.C.'s Next Provincial Election: Get Involved!

Youth at the Booth

B.C.'s next provincial general election is scheduled for Saturday, October 19, 2024. Elections B.C. is hiring secondary school students for the election through the Youth at The Booth program. Students will:

- Work on October 19 as an election official in their community
- Earn at least \$390 for attending training and working a full day
- Gain experience for graduation, their resume and post-secondary applications
- Learn about elections and voting



Register for Student Vote B.C.

Empower your students to become active and informed citizens with the Student Vote program.

More than 170,000 are expected to participate in Student Vote, coinciding with the provincial election on October 19.

Participating schools receive learning materials to teach about government and democracy, and facilitate research into the parties and candidates. Ballots, ballot boxes and voting screens are also provided for the coordination of Student Vote Day.

A Teacher's Guide to Visiting Victoria: Tips and Tricks

Travel Considerations

If you are considering bringing your class to Victoria to visit the Legislature and explore other exciting and educational sites that the city has to offer, allow us to assist you in planning your trip. We have curated a compilation of valuable information to ensure that your visit is not only possible but also manageable. Furthermore, we are readily available to offer ongoing support throughout the entire planning process. This guide is for a group size of approximately 30.

The Parliamentary Education Office at the Legislative Assembly has many resources that you can use in your preparation and planning:

- School Tours (book via online portal)
- Virtual Classrooms
- Little Legislators
- Parliamentary Play and Tour
- Educational sessions for visiting post-secondary classes



Sample Itinerary: Travel from the Southern Interior to Victoria

DAY 1: Travel from Southern Interior to Vancouver

6:00 a.m.	Depart drop off area by bus (teacher tip: highway coach buses are more comfortable for long travel days)
11:00 a.m.	Museum of Anthropology
1:00 p.m.	Eat bag lunch
1:30 p.m.	Tree Top Tour (teacher tip: plan activities within walking distance of each other)
3:00 p.m.	Board bus to travel to ferry (teacher tip: you must arrive 30 minutes in advance of the sailing time)
4:00 p.m.	Board ferry at Tsawwassen Terminal to Swartz Bay Terminal
6:30 p.m.	Arrive at accommodations (teacher tip: UVic has dormitories available to rent)
7:00 p.m.	Walk to restaurant for dinner (teacher tip: restaurants like The Old Spaghetti Factory and Red Robin will send you a menu to pre-order)
8:00 p.m.	Board bus to accommodation
8:30 p.m.	Evening activity
9:15 p.m.	Lights out

If you are travelling from the Interior, planning the trip more than one year in advance allows for fundraising and organizing. It is absolutely worth the effort. We are now beginning to plan for a trip in May 2025.

Teacher tip: there are lots of free outdoor activities in Victoria, so conduct research to find out what works best for your students.

Additional Considerations

The administration required for individual school field trips can very throughout the province. These are notable considerations if you are planning on visiting Victoria, or trips with your students more generally.

1. Sample Letter for ferry travel to Vancouver Island

As a strong advocate for this Place Based Learning Opportunity, here are some helpful notes to book your visit when faced with administrative paperwork or procedures. If you're a colleague travelling from a Vancouver School Board school:

- Consult the Legislative Assembly of B.C.'s website and book your visit
- Book your ferry trip (teacher tip: visit the group bookings site)
- Letters require: school letter head, sentence stating that the trip is for educational purposes, signatures from your principal and vice principal (teacher tip: you need two letters for the trip to and from Victoria)

- 2. Some schools required a detailed safety/trip plan to be completed in advance of travel. The following information is useful to consider:
- Key contact details
- Assistants/volunteers (chaperones)
- Modes of transportation
- Equipment/supplies needed
- Communications plan
- Emergency procedures
- Names and locations of nearest medical facilities (teacher tip: the nearest hospital to the Legislative Assembly is Royal Jubilee Hospital)
- Risk management plan (teacher tip: review what is considered for overnight and higher risk activities in B.C. related to field studies)

Teacher tip: if the VSB hub is accessible to you, you can submit field studies administrative forms via the VSB hub in TEAMS.

Parliamentary Play & Tour for Schools: An Interactive Offering

Looking for a new and exciting way to connect kids with parliament? Sign your class up for the Parliamentary Play & Tour for Schools, an interactive program that includes a guided tour of the Parliament Buildings and an award-winning travelling historical play on the legislative precinct. This year, the Play and Tour for Schools will run from May 21 until the end of June. The session is offered twice a day, at 10:45 a.m. and 12:45 p.m., and runs roughly 80 minutes total. Teachers have two programs to choose from:

My Place in Politics takes audiences back to 1947, where they meet suffragists, students, and chocolate bar strikers. It focuses on how worker groups developed a plan of action to address issues like discrimination, inequality, and the fight for human rights. Then, inside the building, students will learn about participation and representation at today's Parliament Buildings. This program is designed to complement the Grade 5, 6, and 10 social studies curricula but is fun for all grades.

A House for Democracy explores how the parliamentary precinct has been shaped by Indigenous history, colonialism, nationalism, and World War I. Audiences go on a journey through time with notorious architect Francis Rattenbury then venture inside to discuss what the buildings mean to British Columbians today. This program is designed to complement the Grade 9 and 10 social studies curricula, but it is fun for all grades.

Last year, the Parliamentary Play & Tour for Schools debuted to enthusiastic reviews. One teacher raved, "the play was brilliantly written so that it's interactive, informative, and entertaining all in one." Students also expressed their appreciation, saying it made them feel "welcome... in the Parliament Building," and "excited and interested to learn more about government." Some students even announced that after the show, they wanted to work at the Legislative Assembly someday!
