MLAs in the Classroom by Katie Glover, SD35 teacher & BCTI alumnus

There have been few activities I have done with my students that have been as effective and inspirational as visits from our local representatives.

BC teachers should know that our MLAs and MPs are more accessible than one might think. I used to be incredibly nervous about contacting them but once I mustered the confidence to reach out. I was extremely impressed with the results. The past few years I have engaged with Student Vote and whenever there was a federal or a provincial election I arranged an All Candidates meeting for the students. To organize this event, I would usually contact the incumbent first and find some potential dates around their schedule. Once that was confirmed, I would reach out to the other candidates (I always found they were eager and enthusiastic to attend!).



I often held the event in the theater so many Socials classes could join. More recently, we

used Microsoft Teams and Socials classes streamed the meeting. Since I invited multiple classes to participate, I would ask the Socials teachers to send me their students' questions in advance, then compile the most relevant questions, and create a schedule with which student would ask each question. This helped the event go smoothly. Many students commented that the All-Candidates meeting was a highlight of their Socials class that year.

Inviting the MLA and MP to my class when it was not an election was even simpler! For my Political Studies class, I invited our local MLA, Andrew Mercier, and our local MP, Tako van Popta, to speak to my class at different times. To schedule Andrew Mercier, I phoned his office, and his Constituency Assistant was very excited to hear from me. She scheduled a time for him to speak to my class over Teams, and she even sent a box of goodies, such as stickers, pencils and information packets, to distribute to my class. Before the meeting, I reviewed the role of the provincial government with my Grade 11s and 12s, and we looked up Andrew Mercier's responsibilities specifically. We also had learned about political ideologies and party platforms. For this meeting, I had students prepare written questions and keep them on hand during the visit. I did not create a schedule as the visit was a bit more informal. MLA Mercier was incredibly gracious and gave us an hour of his time, ensuring that all of the students' questions were fully answered.

One of the biggest highlights for my Political Studies class was when Mr. Mercier mentioned his virtual visit to Brookwood in the Legislature. He commended my students' questions and even called them out by their names. This experience was exceptionally valuable for the students!

I strongly recommend that other teachers reach out to their local representatives and invite them to attend their classes. In my experience, they have all been eager to speak with my class and the visit was incredibly meaningful for the students. Elections BC: Free Teacher Resources

Museum Outreach Kit: The Royal BC Museum created an outreach kit in partnership with Elections BC called *Having a Voice: Voting Rights and Democracy in BC.* Teachers anywhere in the province can borrow the kit for two weeks for free (including free shipping). It includes activities and primary-source documents that relate to voting and democracy, such as maps, images, and letters. It is designed to fit the grade 5 social studies curriculum, but all ages and classes are invited to borrow it. Teachers can choose which activities they want to use in the kit. Mock Election Kit: Elections BC has mock election kits that they can send to teachers, which will allow students to practice voting year-round. Teachers get to keep the kit; they do not have to return it to Elections BC. Kits have supplies for about 75 people, including

a ballot box, voting screen, map of the electoral districts, resource booklet, activity booklet, pens, pencils, and 'future voter' stickers.
